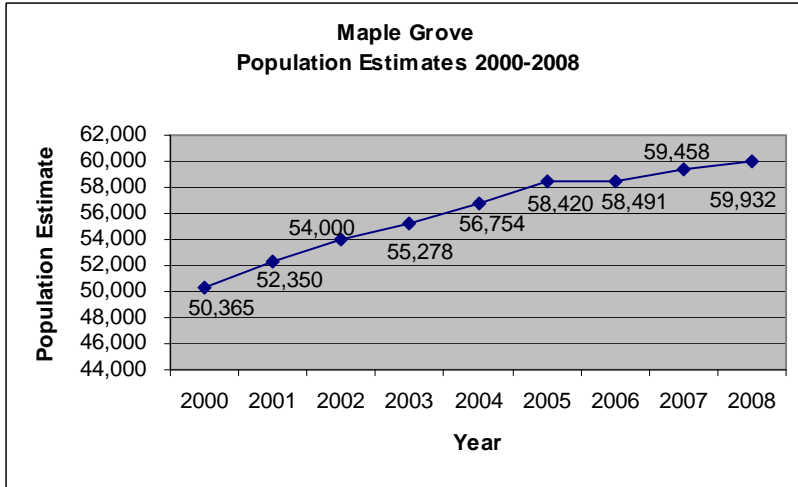

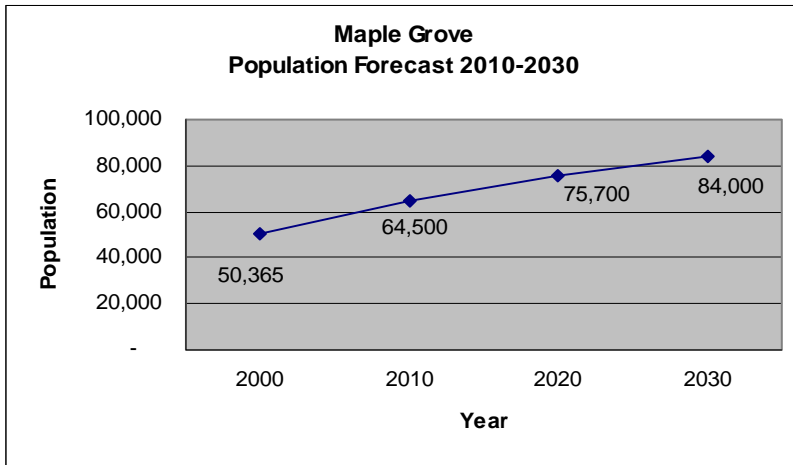


Population



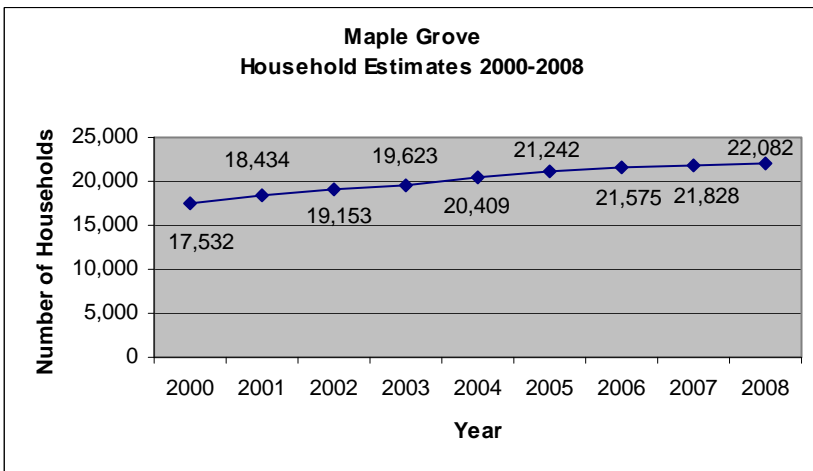
The most recent estimated population of Maple Grove (2008) was 59,932, a 19% increase since 2000. Maple Grove is the third largest city in the Northwest Hennepin region.

The population in Maple Grove in 2010 is projected to increase to 64,500, a 22% increase since 2000. The population is projected to continue to increase to 75,700 by 2020 and to 84,000 by 2030.

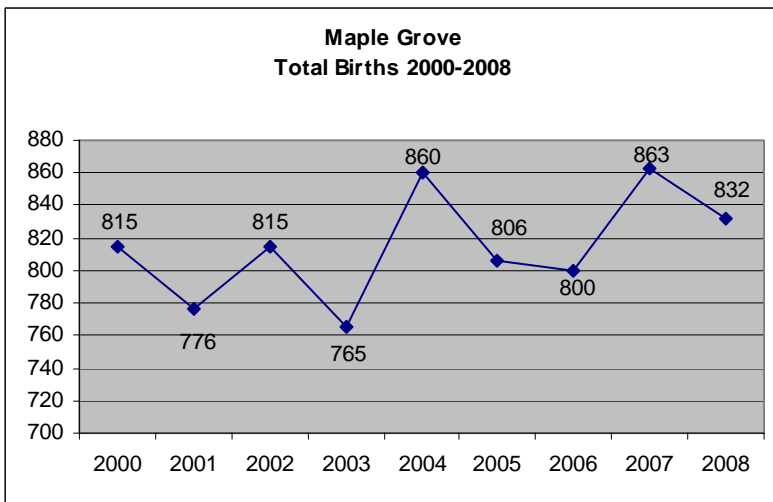


There were an estimated 22,082 households in Maple Grove in 2008, a 26% increase since 2000.

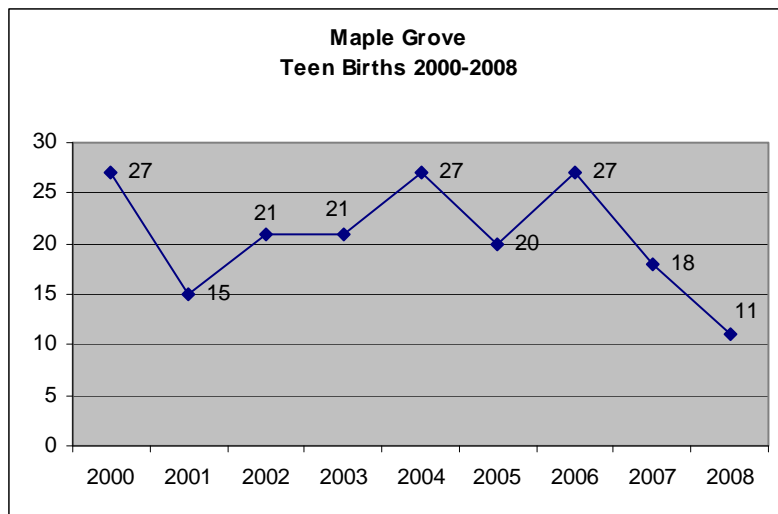
Natality



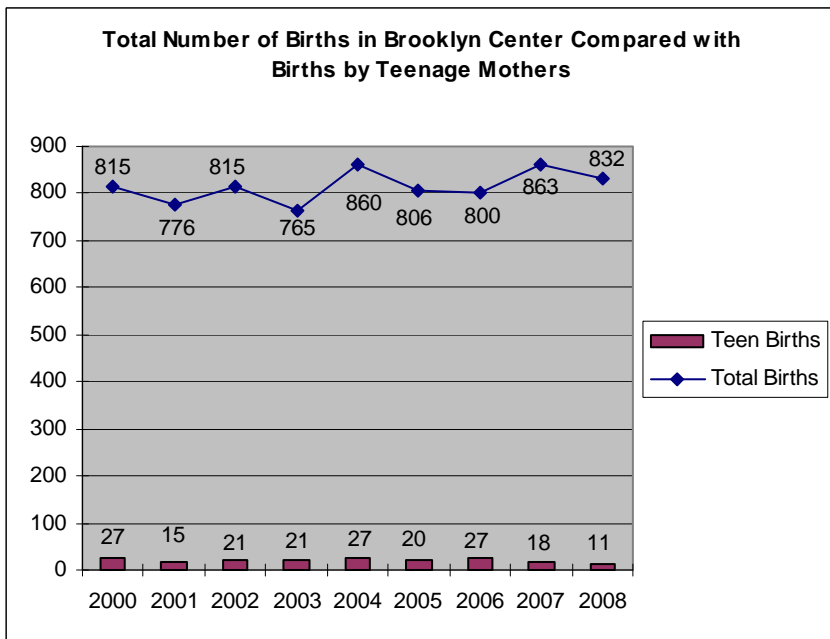
There was a total of 832 births in Maple Grove in 2008, an increase of 8% since 2003. There was an average of 815 births per year between 2000 and 2008.

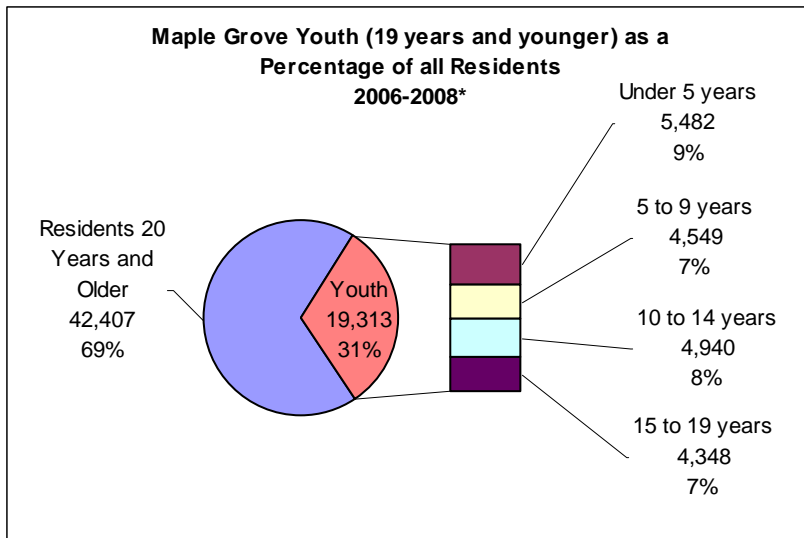

Since 2000, births to teenage mothers comprised 1.3% - 3.4% of total births in Maple Grove.

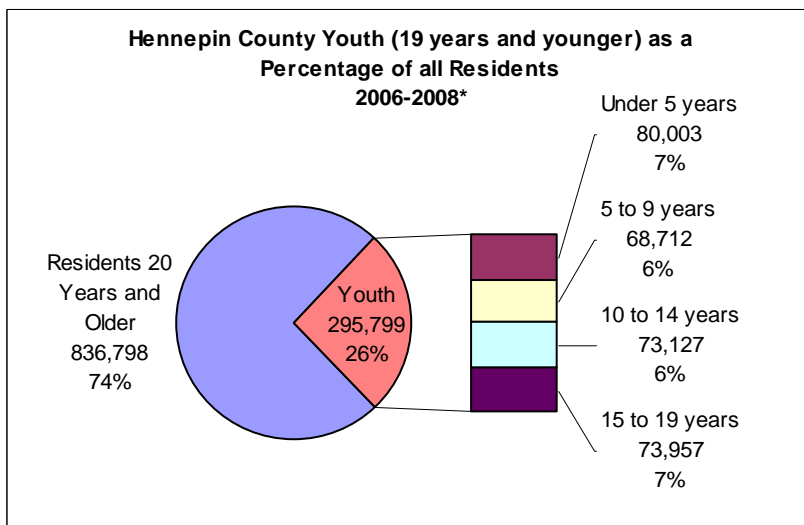


Children and Youth

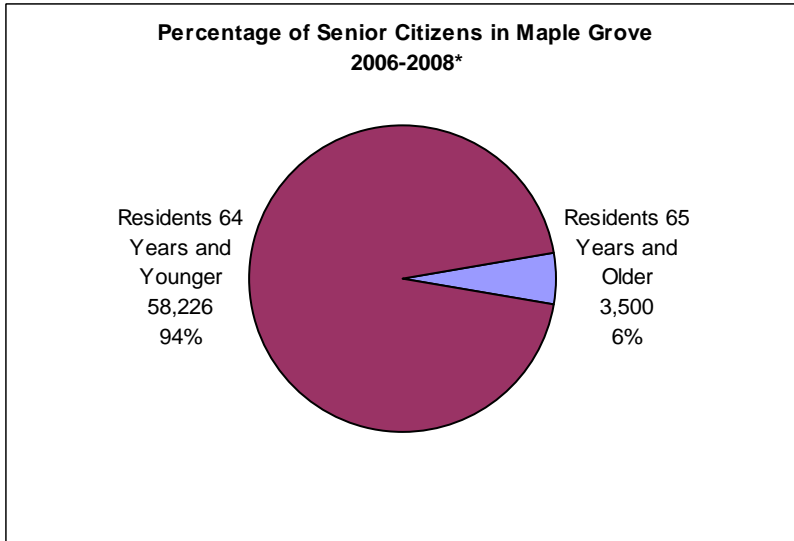

As of May 2010, Maple Grove had 19 licensed childcare centers and 106 licensed family childcare homes.

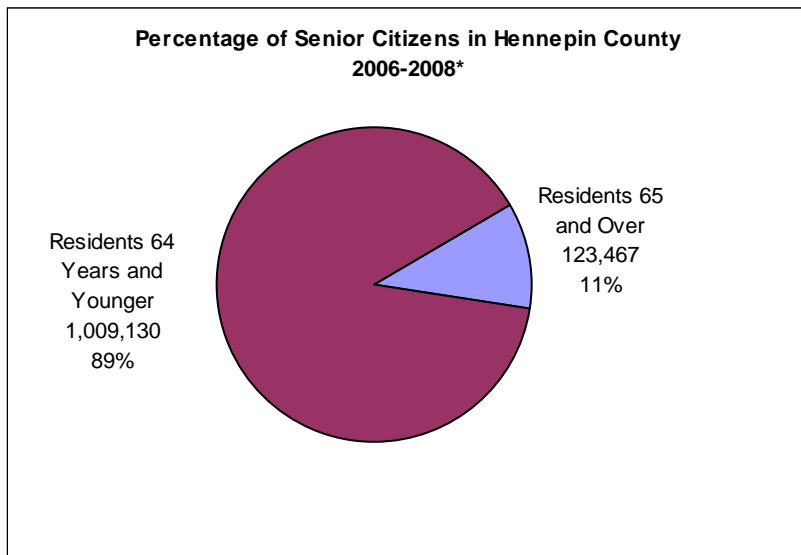

Race, Ethnicity and Language

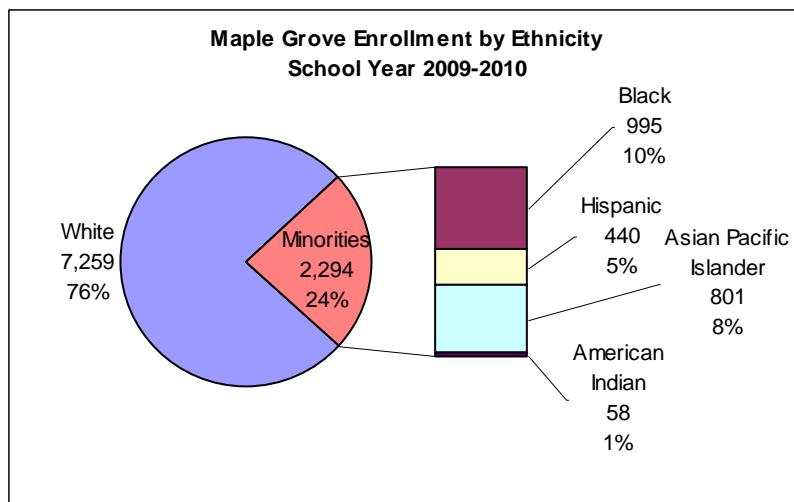
Maple Grove is home to many people from diverse backgrounds, including immigrants and refugees. It is difficult to accurately estimate non-English speaking populations, in part because many members of these communities were born in the U.S. and are native English speakers. While data on primary home languages cannot provide an exact count of the number of immigrants or refugees in a city, it does provide a tool to estimate the size of immigrant communities and help locate these communities geographically. Additionally, the composition of race and ethnicity at schools within Maple Grove does not provide for an exact count but does provide a glimpse into the demographic make-up of Maple Grove.

According to the American Community Survey*, Maple Grove residents are primarily White (90%). Asians represented the largest minority population (5%).

The total enrollment at the twelve schools located in Maple Grove for the 2009-2010 school year was 9,553 students. Minorities made up 24% (2,294) of the student population.

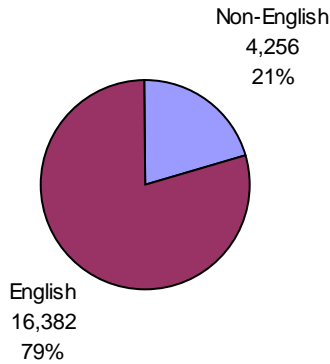
The Minnesota Department of Education reported that schools located in Maple Grove (not limited to Maple Grove residents) had 76% (7,259) White students, 10% (995) Black students, 8% (801) Asian Pacific Islander students, 5% (440) Hispanic students, and 1% (58) American Indian students.

School Year 2008-2009**

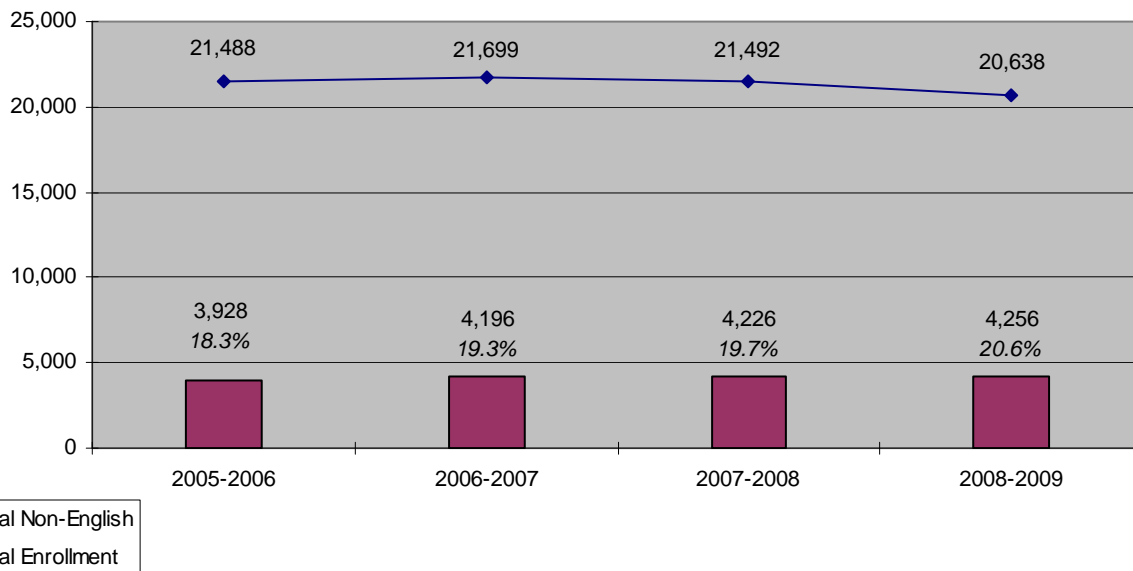


Maple Grove is primarily served by Osseo School District.

Osseo School Districts enrolled 20,638 students in the 2008-2009 school year; 21% (4,256) of the students reported a primary home language other than English. Wayzata School District enrolled 9,177 students in the 2008-2009 school year; 9.1% (923) of the students reported a primary home language other than English.

2005 - 2008**



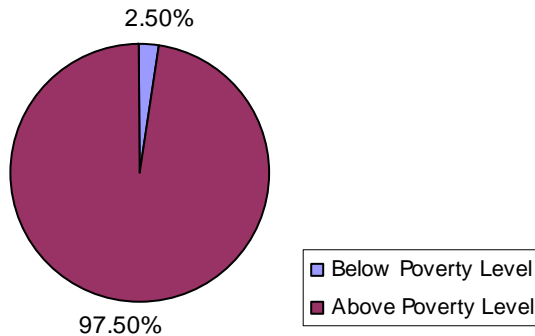

Between the 2005-2006 and 2008-2009 school year, non-English primary home language speakers in the Osseo School District comprised 18.3% - 20.6% of total enrollment.



Poverty

Percentage of People Whose Income in the Past 12 Months was Below the Poverty Level



According to the American Community Survey, 1,543 people lived below poverty in Maple Grove in the past 12 months; 2.50% of the total population.

The federal poverty level for a family of four was \$20,000 in 2006 and \$21,200 in 2008.

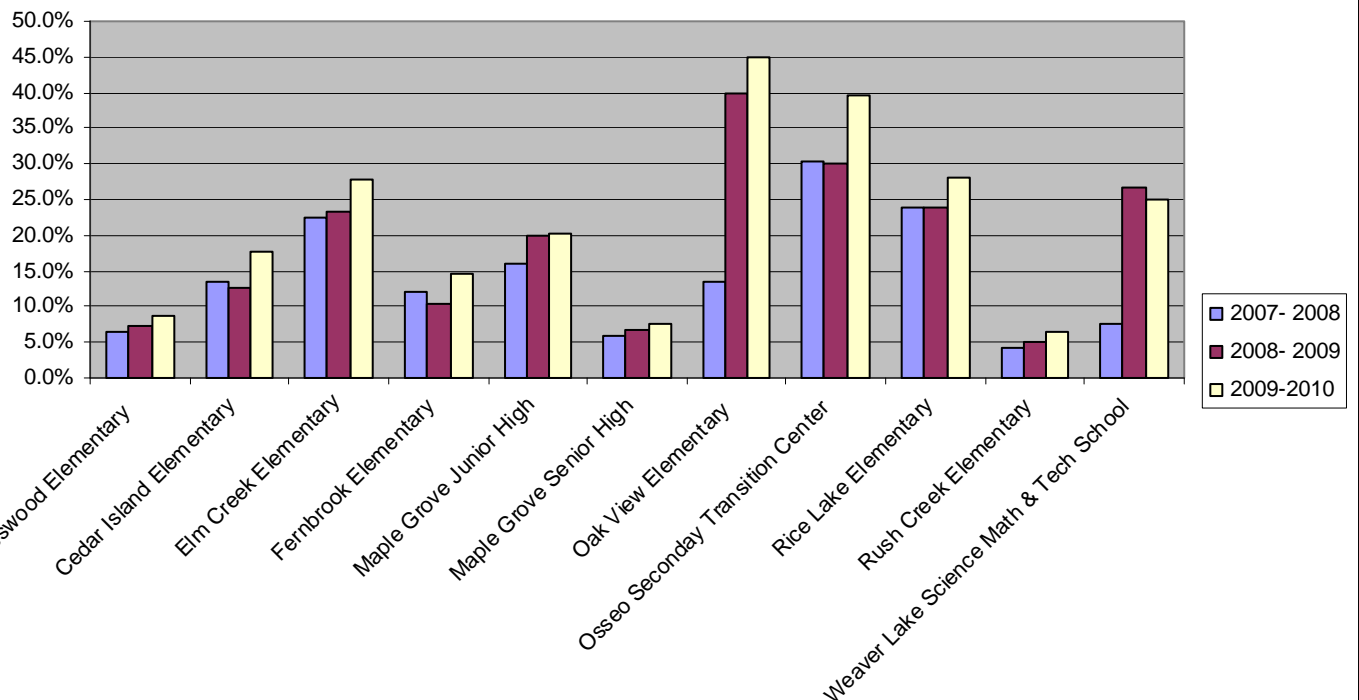

Students are eligible for the *Free and Reduced Price Meals Program* in public school based on their families income. A household income must be below 130% of the federal poverty level (\$28,665) for a family of four to qualify for free meals and below 185% (\$40,793) of poverty for reduced meals. Rates are from July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010.

Out of the eleven public schools in Maple Grove, Oak View Elementary had the highest percentage (44.9%) of students eligible for free or reduced price meals. All the schools in Maple Grove, except for Weaver Lake Science, Math, and Technology School, experienced a growth of the number of students eligible for the *Free and Reduced Price Meals Program* from 2008-2009 to the 2009-2010 school year.

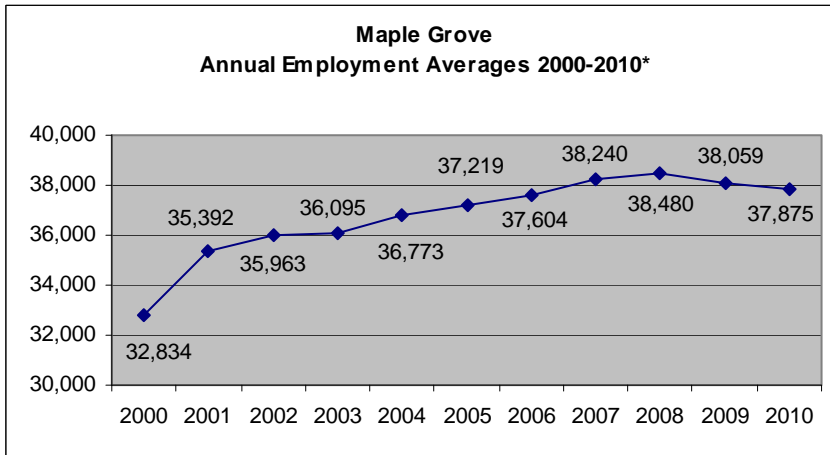
Percentage of Students Eligible for Free or Reduced Meals at Public Schools in Maple Grove School Year 2007-2008, 2008-2009 and 2009-2010





Employment

Employment statistics from the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development are based on results from monthly surveys of households conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Census Bureau. Average employment is the average number of city residents who are employed for pay or who did 15 or more hours unpaid work for a family business during the survey week.



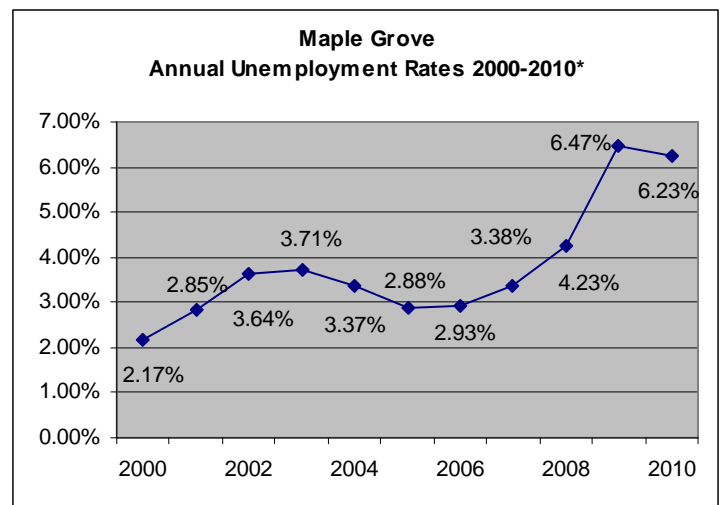
According to the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development, average annual employment (not seasonally adjusted) for 2008 in Maple Grove was 38,480. This is a slight increase (0.62%) since 2007.

The unemployment rate of a city is the percent of the city's labor force who do not have a job, have actively looked for work in the prior four weeks and are currently available for work. It does not include people who wanted and were available for work and had looked for a job sometime in the past year, but not in the past four weeks. The average annual unemployment rate for Maple Grove (not seasonally adjusted) was 6.47% in 2009, an increase of 34% since 2008.

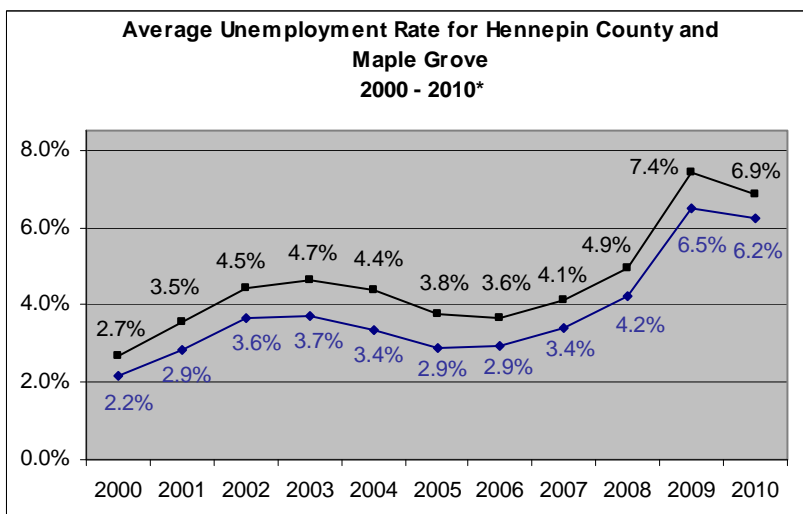

Maple Grove's 2009 annual average unemployment rate (6.5%) (not seasonally adjusted), was lower than that of Hennepin County's (7.4%) rate as a whole.

Maple Grove and Hennepin County's annual average unemployment rates have increased since 2006.

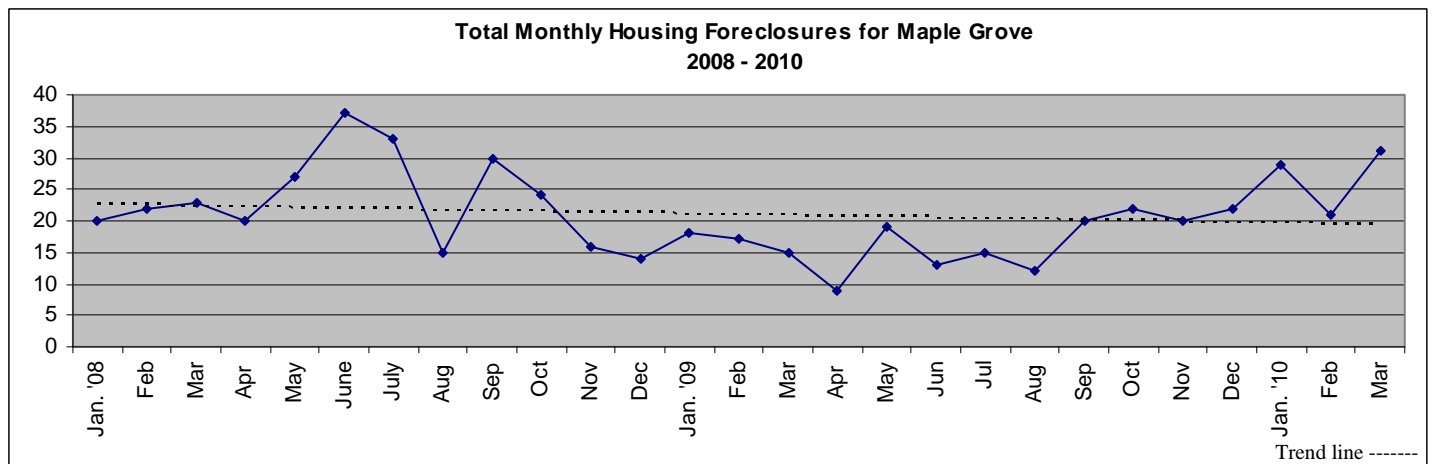

Housing

Like other cities in Hennepin County, Maple Grove has been impacted by the sub-prime mortgage crisis. Over the past seventeen months (January 2008 - March 2010) the foreclosure trend in Maple Grove is slightly downward. In 2008, Maple Grove ranked third in the number of foreclosures (281) in the Northwest Hennepin County region and third for 2009 with 202.
