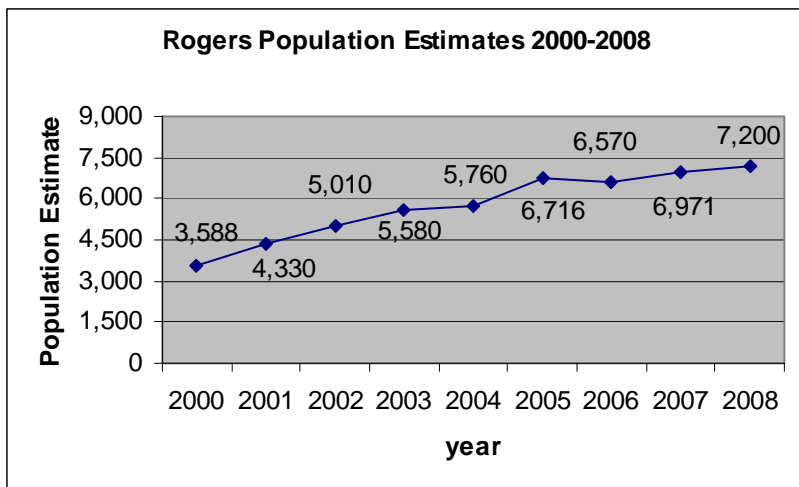

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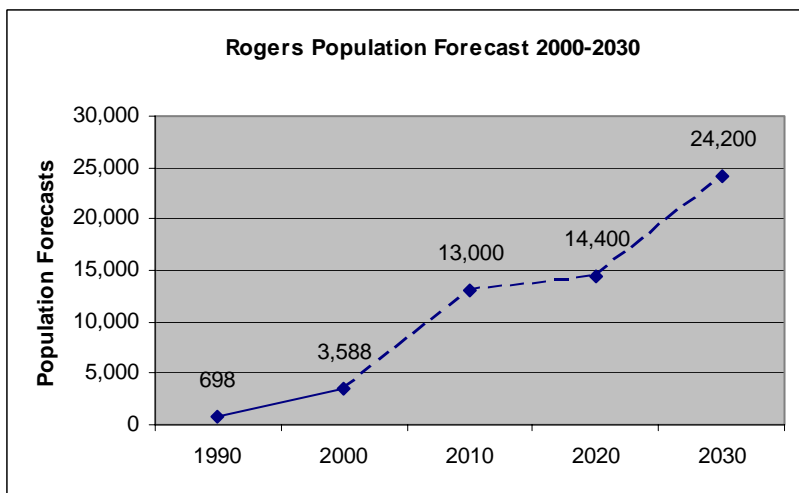


Population



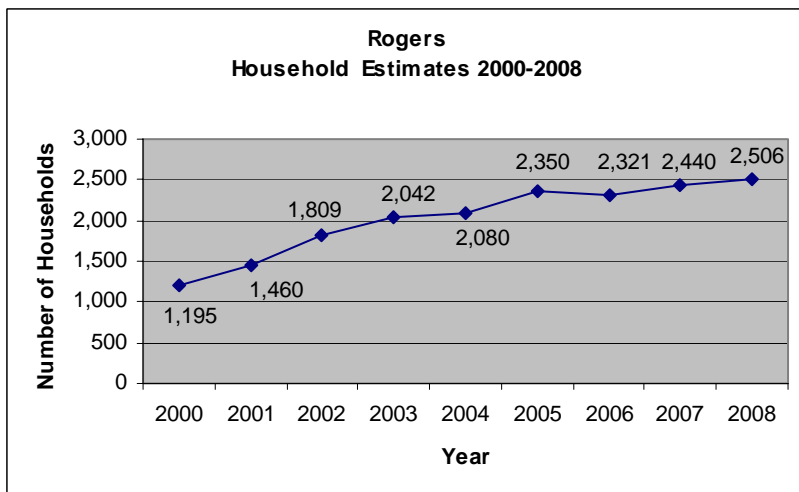
The most recent estimated population of Rogers (2008) was 7,200, an increase of 101% since 2000. Rogers is the 10th largest city in the Northwest Hennepin region, according to the Metropolitan Council.

The population in Rogers is projected to increase to 13,000 in 2010. The population is projected to continue to increase to 14,400 by 2020, and to 24,200 by 2030.

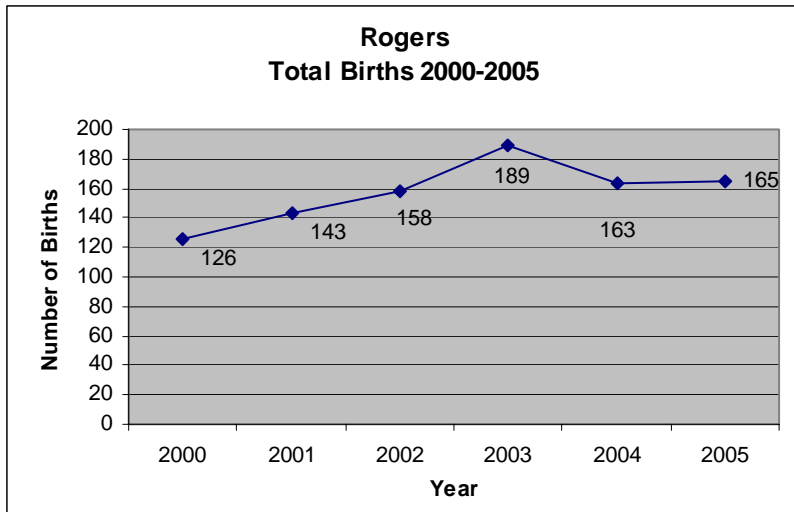


The Metropolitan Council estimated the number of households in Rogers in 2008 at 2,506. This is a 110% increase since 2000.

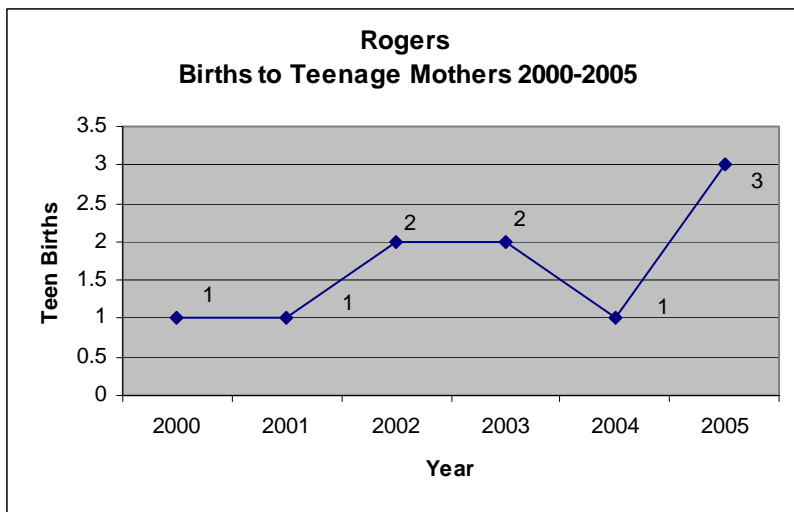


Natality



There was a total of 165 births Rogers in 2005. This is an increase of 24% from 2000. The average number of births in Rogers in the 5-year period from 2000 to 2005 is 157 births per year.

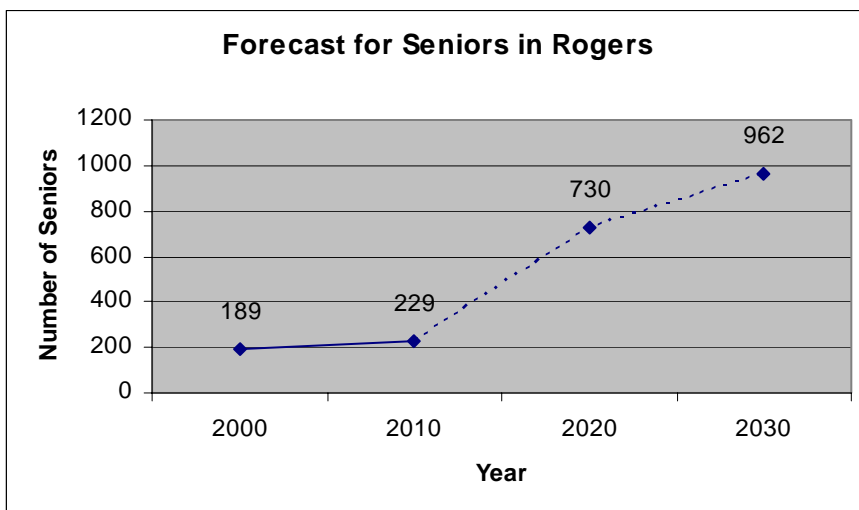

To serve the needs of the number of children under 5 years old, as of July 2009, the city of Rogers had 6 childcare centers and 40 family childcare homes.

The population of seniors in Rogers is projected to increase to 229 by 2010 an increase of 21% since 2000. The population of seniors in Rogers is then projected to drastically increase to 730 in 2020, and to 962 in 2030.

The population of seniors in Rogers does not take into account 'group quarters living'. The United States Census Bureau and the American Community Survey defines group quarters as, "A group quarters is a place where people live or stay, in a group living arrangement, that is owned or managed by an entity or organization providing housing and/or services for the residents. This is not a typical household-type living arrangement. These services may include custodial or medical care as well as other types of assistance, and residency is commonly restricted to those receiving these services. People living in group quarters are usually not related to each other."

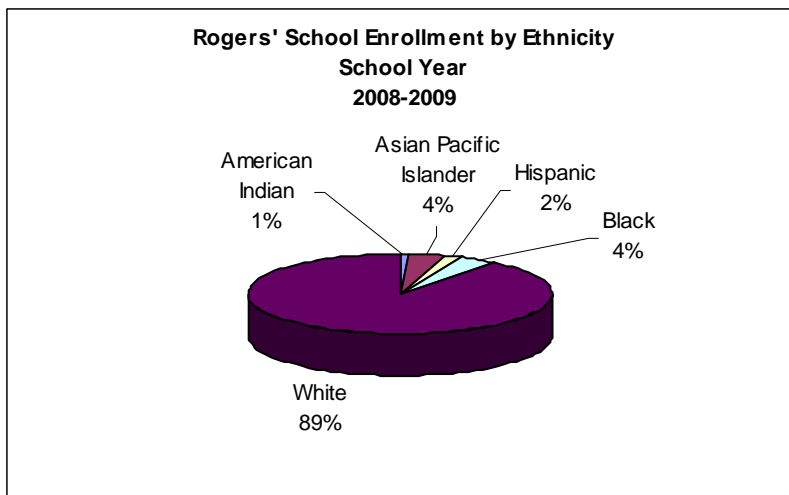

Race, Ethnicity and Languages

Rogers is home to people from diverse backgrounds, including immigrants and refugees. It is difficult to accurately estimate non-English-speaking populations, in part because many members of these communities were born in the U.S. and are native English speakers. While data on primary home languages cannot provide an exact count of the number of immigrants in a city, it does provide a tool to estimate the size of immigrant communities and help locate these communities geographically.

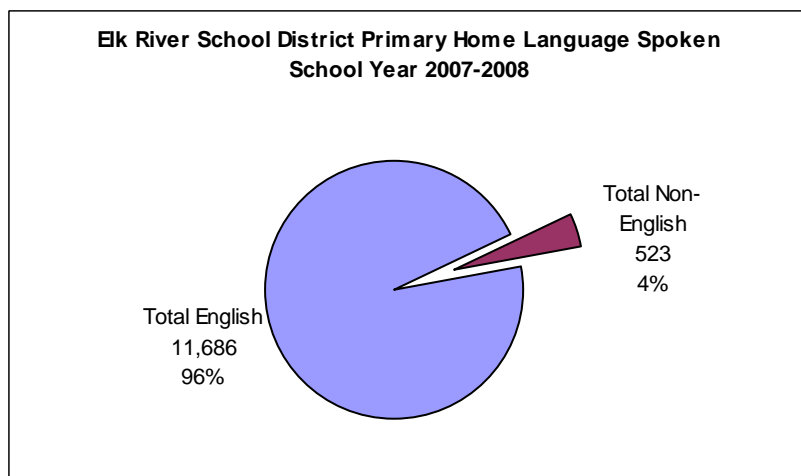


According to the 2008-2009 school records from the Minnesota Department of Education, schools serving Rogers' student population (not limited to Rogers' residents) had 89% white students, 4% black students, 4% Asian Pacific Islander students, 2% Hispanic students and 1% American Indian students.

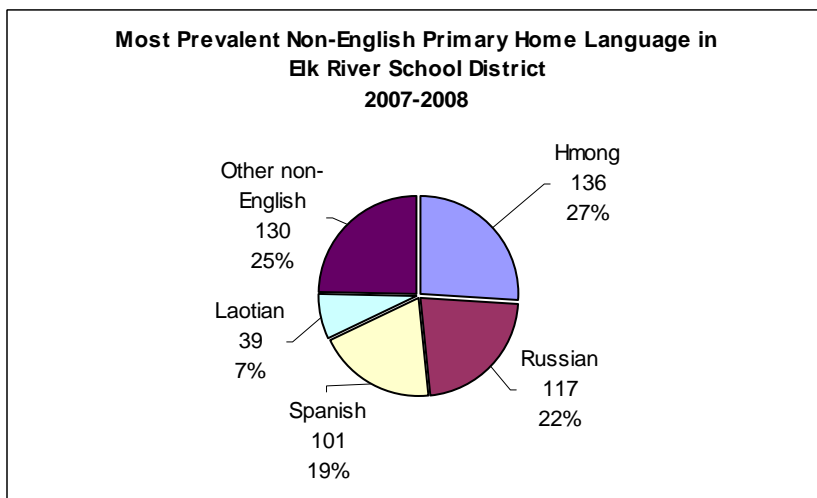

Rogers is served by the Elk River School District, in which 35 languages are spoken.

523 students (4% of the total student population) at the Elk River School District reported speaking a non-English language as their primary home language in the school year 2007-2008.

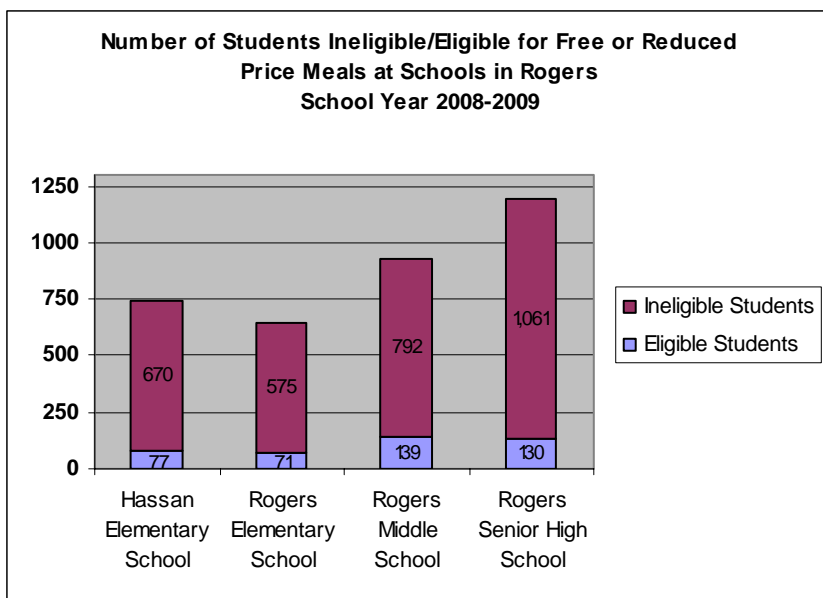


The most prevalent non-English language spoken in the Elk River School District during the 2007-2008 school year, was Hmong. 136 students reported Hmong as their primary home language. Other non-English languages spoken were Russian (117 students), Spanish (101 students) and Laotian (39 students). The remaining 130 non-English primary home language students spoke one of the 30 other languages prevalent in the school district.

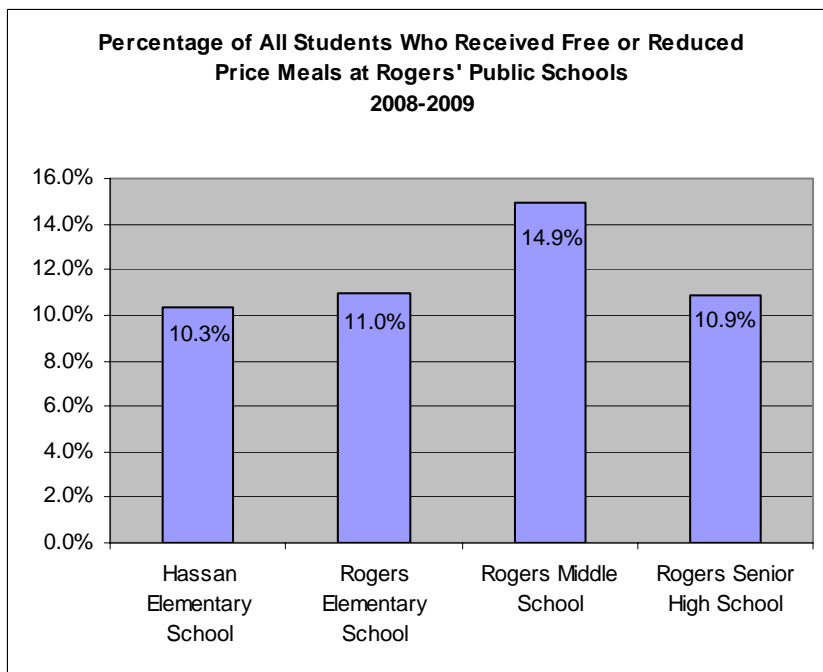
Poverty



Eligibility for the Free and Reduced Price Meals Program is based on income; student's household income must be below 130% of the federal poverty level, \$28,665 for a family of four, to qualify for free meals and below 185% of poverty for reduced meals, \$40,793.

Each of the four schools in Rogers has students eligible for free or reduced meals. Rogers Middle School has the largest number of students eligible for the program with 139 students.

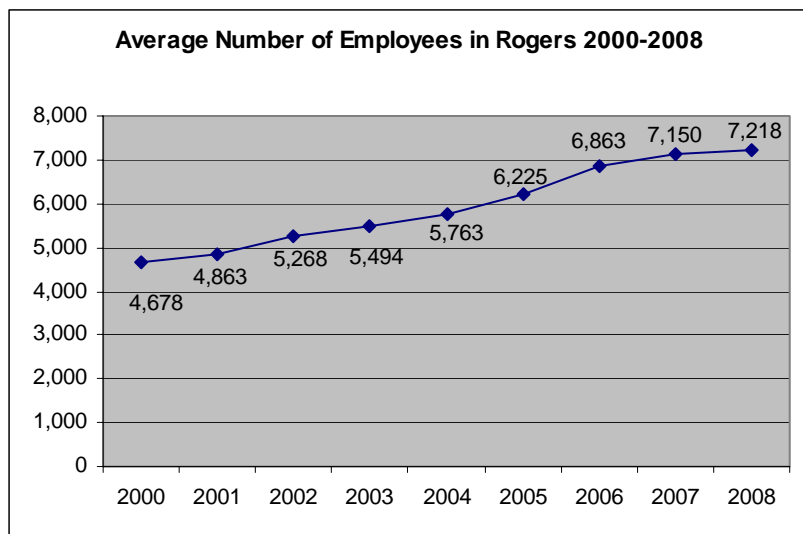
Among the four public schools in Rogers, Rogers Middle School and Rogers Elementary School had the highest percentage of students eligible for free or reduced meals, 14.9% and 11.0% respectively.

Employment

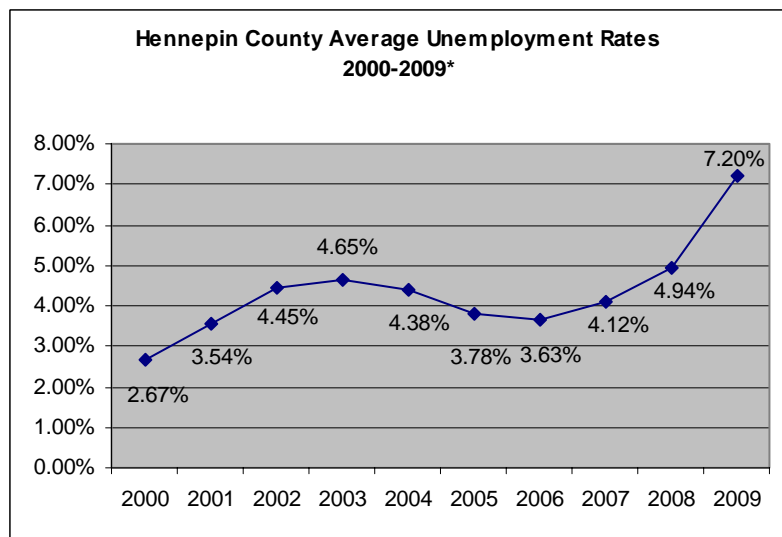
Employment statistics from the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development are based on results from quarterly surveys of employers around the state conducted by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Census Bureau. Workers and jobs excluded from these statistics include proprietors and the self-employed, railroad workers, family farm workers, full-time students working for their school, elected government officials, insurance and real estate salespeople, and others who work only on a commission basis.



The average number of employees in Rogers in 2008 was 7,218, an increase of 31% since 2003.

The unemployment rate of a city is the percent of the city's labor force who do not have a job, have actively looked for work in the prior four weeks and are currently available for work. It does not include those "marginally attached," people who wanted and were available for work and had looked for a job sometime in the past year, but not in the past four weeks.



Unemployment data is not available for Rogers due to its small population.

In Hennepin County, the average annual unemployment rate (not seasonally adjusted) was 4.94% in 2008.

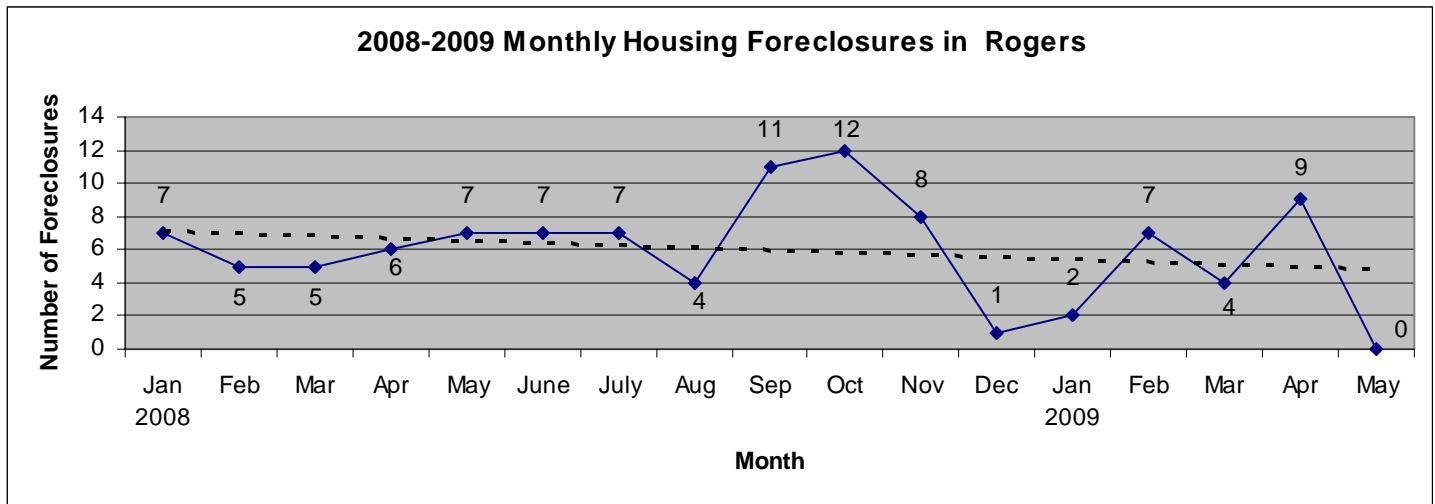

Housing

Like other cities in Hennepin County, Rogers has been impacted by the sub-prime mortgage crisis. Over the past 17 months (Jan. 2008 - May 2009) the trend of foreclosures in Rogers is headed downward. For 2008, Rogers ranked 9th in the number of foreclosures (80) in the Northwest Hennepin County region. As of May 2009, Rogers had 22 foreclosures, ranking 9th in the Northwest Hennepin County region.
